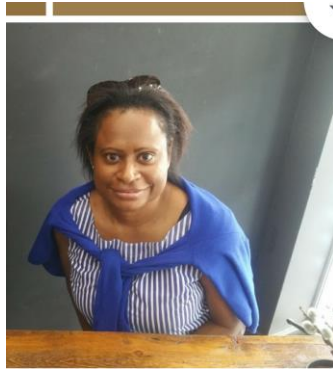

Indofest Adelaide 2021

“Indofest-Adelaide is a vibrant community festival celebrating all things Indonesian. The local Indonesian community has been bringing the cuisine and culture of one of Australia’s closest and most important neighbours to Adelaide since 2008.”

The Indofest event is an annual Indonesian festival held in the City of Adelaide. It is an event wholly run by volunteers from the Australian and Indonesian communities, including students from the major Universities. The significant aim of Indofest is to infuse creativity and develop opportunities for the ongoing cultural awareness and business growth between Indonesia and Australia. It brings together the Indonesian cultural performing arts (in conjunction with the South Australian Aboriginal cultural groups), university participation (including student volunteers), education (Bahasa Indonesia language schools), food stallers selling mainly Indonesian culinary dishes, and business enterprises in celebration of friendship and heritage.

Reports on the past 10 Indofest events indicate the number of attendees has grown considerably and gradually reached an estimate of 10,000 visitors during recent festivals. Partnering with its stakeholders, the festival visitation target has been capped by the South Australian government to 2,000 for this year due to COVID protocols.

This reduction has not impaired the community and volunteer spirit to continue making the event happen which will be held on **Sunday, 28 March 2021**, at the **Pinky Flat grounds** in the Adelaide CBD. The Coronavirus pandemic has indeed seen countries grind to a halt, and South Australia is no exception. However, with a sound and robust COVID Management Plan approved by the SA Health, certified COVID Marshalls on board, and a highly experienced and dedicated team of volunteers, the Indofest-Adelaide 2021 Committee (led by Joyce Hassan) is excited and prepared to deliver the event to the community.



A Tribute to Alisha Hill

Alisha Hill and Indofest

We often think of the Australia-Indonesia relationship in dichotomous terms, with people being either Indonesian or Australian, belonging to one group or the other. Often overlooked are those that exist in the liminal space somewhere in between; labelled as belonging to one country by virtue of their birth, but too heavily entrenched in the culture of the other to be defined solely by the crest emblazoned on their passport. Alisha Hill was one of the in-betweeners.

Indofest went from humble beginnings to become a major event on Adelaide's festival calendar and our community should feel rightly proud. This success can be attributed entirely to the dedication and hard work of community members, including Alisha, who pulled out all of the stops to make it happen. Alisha was a stalwart of the festival who worked on the Indofest team for many years. She often preferred to work quietly behind the scenes and her significant contribution to getting the festival off the ground and getting punters through the gates year after year went largely uncredited as she worked tirelessly in the background.



By the time we took the reins for Indofest's tenth anniversary in 2017, Alisha had decided to 'retire' from Indofest. However, when she saw our blood pressure rising as Hari-H approached, she very kindly offered to resume her role as social media coordinator, to help shoulder the load for her friends and community. Alisha's enviable knowledge of all things Indonesian, her diligence in her work, her commitment to the team and flair for the written word were critical to the success of Indofest.

Alisha was a great friend to many in our community; she was kind, passionate, committed and hardworking, often in the face of adversity, as she met with many challenges to her health. We will remember her with much affection as a generous friend who was quick-witted and funny, and always available for *curhat* when the pressure was on.

Indofest is just one of many places that Alisha's legacy will continue to be visible. May we always remember Alisha's extraordinary contributions to our community and draw inspiration from her kindness, tenacity and compassion. It was our pleasure and privilege to know and work with Alisha. We extend our love to Mas Win and Alisha's family.
