






Selly's Corner

Hello Indo

Hello Indo is an Indonesian restaurant located on Gouger Street in the Adelaide CBD. The business offers a range of traditional Indonesian dishes, with a focus on approachable, home-style flavours.

With a broad menu reflecting well-known Indonesian favourites, Hello Indo provides a straightforward introduction to Indonesian cuisine for local diners.

PPIA-SA (Drinks Stall)

Perhimpunan Pelajar Indonesia Australia (PPI Australia) was founded in Canberra on 8 March 1981 to support and connect Indonesian students in Australia and help promote Indonesian culture within the wider community.

The organisation is structured at three levels: national (PPI Australia Pusat), state branches (PPI Australia Cabang), and campus-based groups (PPI Australia Ranting).

PPIA South Australia (PPIA-SA) represents Indonesian students across the University of Adelaide, the University of South Australia, Flinders University, and TAFE institutes. This year, PPIA-SA will also be running a drinks stall at Indofest 2025, offering refreshments for visitors throughout the day.









Performers

Indofest-Adelaide features a range of performers presenting music, dance, and other cultural showcases from different parts of Indonesia.

The program includes both traditional and contemporary styles, reflecting the variety of artistic expression found across the archipelago. Performers include community groups, student organisations, and independent artists, each contributing their own interpretation of Indonesian culture.







Gamelan Sekar Laras

Gamelan Sekar Laras is Adelaide's community gamelan group dedicated to the teaching and performance of Indonesian music, dance and theatre. It was formed in 1983 and is hosted by the Flinders University in its beautiful Pendopo.

Their ensemble will perform in Indofest Adelaide 2025's opening ceremony.




North Shed Band

North Shed Band is a local music group performing classic Indonesian folk and ethnic songs. Their set features a selection of 5–7 pieces that highlight the warmth, storytelling, and cultural roots found in Indonesia's musical traditions. The band is made up of four members, Tony Baskoro, Robin, Kel and Harvey.

They combine vocals, live guitar, and backing tracks to present a familiar yet refreshing take on well-loved songs. Their performance aims to share the sounds of Indonesia with audiences of all ages, offering a relaxed and enjoyable listening experience inspired by diverse regional influences.







Calvin D

Calvin D is an independent singer and songwriter based in Adelaide. He enjoys creating and performing music, with a focus on songs that are easy to listen to and can be enjoyed by a wide range of audiences.

Svara Rasa

The name "Svara Rasa" comes from the initials of the two performers, Shania and Ruth. The group was formed because the two friends share a love of music.

"Svara Rasa" comes from Sanskrit, where Svara means sound/tone and Rasa means feeling or meaning.

The name reflects their intention to create music that is born from sincerity of emotion and harmony of sound. It also represents their love for Indonesia; although both performers live in Australia, their group name continues to reflect their Indonesian roots.



Kevin C.N. & Thomas

Kevin C.N. and Thomas are teaming up for a relaxed acoustic performance featuring three Indonesian songs and one original track. Blending vocals and guitar, their set highlights well-known Indonesian favourites while also introducing their own work to the audience.



Flobamora

"Flobamora" refers to the Flobamora Indonesian Association in Adelaide, a community group that represents the islands of Flores, Sumba, Timor, and Alor in Indonesia. It holds meetings and events for the local Indonesian community.

The Flobamora community will present two beautiful dances from East Nusa Tenggara (NTT). The first performance is Tari Ja'i, a traditional dance from Bajawa, on the island of Flores. Originally performed during harvest celebrations and traditional ceremonies, Ja'i symbolizes togetherness, joy, and gratitude. It is performed by men and women in groups, forming circles or long lines, moving rhythmically in harmony. Today, Ja'i is often performed at various cultural and social events to celebrate unity and community spirit.

The second performance is a contemporary dance accompanied by the song Ikan Naik di Pantai, expressing happiness and togetherness.

For this part, the dancers will also invite the audience to join in, sharing the joyful energy of East Nusa Tenggara.



Adelindo Angklung

Adelindo is a well-known Indonesian angklung ensemble based in Adelaide, celebrated for bringing the unique beauty of bamboo music to life. Through the gentle yet vibrant sounds of angklung, they create a harmonious performance that showcases Indonesia's rich musical heritage. Their music is both playful and elegant, inviting the audience to experience the traditional charm of this iconic Indonesian instrument.
